Human Trafficking

"Human trafficking is the fastest-growing criminal enterprise in the world, generating approximately 150 billion dollars annually and enslaving more than 40 million men, women and children worldwide." (sistersagainsttrafficking.org)

"Human trafficking is a crime that involves compelling or coercing a person to provide labor or services, or to engage in commercial sex acts. The coercion can be subtle or overt, physical or psychological." (US Department of Justice)

SIGNS OF TRAFFICKING:

- Malnourishment
- Fearful, nervous, depressed
- Inappropriate, sexualized clothing
- New or unusual tattoos/branding, scarring, cigarette burns
- Evidence of being controlled
- Younger girl with an "older boyfriend"

HOW DOES TRAFFICKING START?

- Online grooming: Traffickers use the anonymity of the internet to develop trust and friendships.
- Apps used by traffickers: All social media and dating apps, online ads.
- Traffickers Promise: They promise instant love, willingness to pay for travel and other gifts, jobs.

HOW CAN I HELP TO PREVENT TRAFFICKING?

- Become Informed: Read, visit anti-trafficking websites, attend a human trafficking presentation.
- Volunteer: Help distribute materials and/or assist in presentations and workshops.
- Support and Advocate: Support legislation to stop human trafficking.
